Nursing Home

There are two main differences between a skilled ursing facility and a nursing home.

Skilled Nursing Facility (SNF)

- A skilled nursing facility (SNF) is an inpatient facility where patients receive nursing and therapy care.
 - Skilled short-term care
 - Manages patients with more complex conditions
 - Patient needs rehab
- Stays may be covered by insurance subject to out-of-pocket copays and deductibles.

Long-term care (nursing home)

- A person who needs permanent residence for supportive care
- Patient **does not** require skilled care or rehab
- Payment by private pay or medical assistance if you qualify

A short term person who needs:

- IV antibiotics
- Wound care
- Rehab after surgery
- Therapy after a stroke, accident, or injury
- Rehab or skilled care after a recent hospital stay

For short term care, average length of stay is 24 days. Your length of stay will depend on your condition and your care plan.

It must be returned after your care in the program ends. 	 An assisted living residence or assisted living facility provides housing for people who cannot live independently. Services may include medicine management, assistance with using the bathroom, dressing, or grooming. Housekeeping, meals, and laundry, as well as social programs and activities are typically included. 	 Home health agencies provide care for homebound patients who need nursing or therapy services. Patients can be safely cared for in their homes. As a home health patient, a provider or team of providers will visit you at home to: Provide you with skilled nursing services such as wound care, injections, or IV (intravenous therapy). Monitor your progress and adjust your plan of care if necessary. Teach you and your loved ones about your condition and how to better manage it. Deliver physical, occupational, and speech therapy services, as needed. 	 Hospice brings care into your home by a team of qualified clinicians and skilled individuals.
